Station #1

Station #2

Station #4

Name the types of foods that can cause stomach upsets in pets if ingested based on what you learned from class

Station #5

Suddenly your dog begins convulse, what is this a sign of?

Station #6

Your pet begins to start foaming at the mouth, drool excessively, and refuses to eat multiple meals. What is this a sign of?

Next, What can a vet give your pet to absorb the toxins for emergency stabilization/treatment to prevent further absorption in the body and to remove the toxin?

Station #7

Many types of plants and flowers can be poisonous to pets. Effects range from mild to severe depending on the type of plant and quantity consumed. Some plants only cause slight stomach upset, while others can cause seizures, coma, or even death. You have

decided to purchase some new plants or flowers for your house. What are the steps you should take if your pet has ingested an unidentified plant?
